### English

Our students are currently reading even more than usual! The shortlist for the Carnegie Award has been announced and all the students have been challenged to read at least one of these 8 books. 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
#### Maths

In February, 40 of our top year 9 students entered the UKMT (UK Maths Trust) Intermediate Maths Challenge.

The UKMT maths challenges are entered by over 600,000 students from over 4,000 schools across the UK and the intermediate level is aimed at students in years 9-11. The challenge consists of multiple choice questions designed to stimulate interest in mathematics, as it is entirely problem and logic solving using mathematical knowledge - it is very different to the 'traditional' style questions students see in class and assessments.

Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates are only awarded to the top 40% of students nationally and we are really proud of the following students for gaining a bronze certificate; Khulh Elgareidi, Molly Doran and Kaylan Wroblewski. A number of other students only missed out on a certificate by a couple of points and I am sure that as they move through to year 10 and 11 we will see more certificates gained at Nottingham Free School.

### Boys' PE Kit (Summer Activities)

- **Rugby shirt:** Navy blue rugby shirt with collar and official logo.
- Shorts: Navy blue shorts must be brought to all lessons.
- **Training trousers:** Plain black/navy the wearing of training trousers will depend on the activity and the weather conditions and will be at the teachers' discretion, unless you have a medical or religious reason for wearing them. These should be brought **in addition to shorts** and not instead of shorts.
- **Socks:** White ankle socks

All of year 8 visited the local Gurdwara or Nottingham Liberal Synagogue in Sherwood. The students had a fantastic time learning first hand about different artefacts and more about what it means to be a Jew or a Sikh in Britain today. We're so lucky to have these vibrant faith communities on our doorstep.

Thank you so much to Bill Landa, and Mike Harris and Shirley at the respective places of worship who looked after us and gave up their time to lead the visits. Also a massive thank you to the students who were superb. A particular thank you to Solly Worth who chanted from the Torah for the students who visited the synagogue.





Students have been using this experience, along with work on other places of worship in class, to design a multi-faith place of worship. We look forward to seeing their designs after Easter.

We were also lucky enough to have a magistrate visit us. Pete Dexter came to talk to our GCSE philosophy and ethics classes as part of our topic on Crime and Punishment. Pete Dexter delivered a talk to the classes about work as a magistrate and differences between the Magistrate Court and Crown court. It was fascinating to her him speak and the students certainly got some ideas about future careers. A big thank you to Pete for giving up his time to come and visit us.

### PSHCE

It's been a busy term in PSHCE, with year 9 students learning about finance and budgeting thanks to some wonderful volunteers from Nottingham Trent University and Santander.

Year 9 have also been working on their life saving skills and learning how to do CPR, as our lovely volunteer Emma has been back from The British Red Cross.

Some members of year 7 attended a mock United Nations summit at Nottingham Trent University and showed off their negotiating and democratic skills representing a range of different countries. It was a great day with students also getting to find out and sample food from a range of African countries during the University's global week. It certainly opened up their eyes to the exciting and diverse opportunities that University has to offer.

As a school we are also working towards a Drug Aware Award with a variety of activities planned for the next term.

### Art
