Year 8 students have been very excited to create their silk paintings and have also learnt about the use of mood boards in the design industry, their theme is under the sea so look out for some of their underwater silk masterpieces in our end of year art exhibition.



Year 9 continue to impress with their artistic skills and are developing their use of palette knife and textures with acrylic paint in response to artist Polly Jones whose work they have been studying. Year 10 are working hard on their sketchbooks, learning to present their work effectively and starting to become more independent in their ideas and work.



Year 11 have been working incredibly hard towards their exam preparatory work, they sit their 10-hour exam on Tuesday 30 April and Thursday 2 May, their coursework and exam pieces will be exhibited in our end of year exhibition so watch this space.



PSHCE

In PSHCE, students have been exploring a wide range of topics and students in all year groups always impress staff with their maturity, empathy and respect in class discussions. Year 9 students learnt CPR training during the last half term, a very valid skill with the brilliant British Red Cross who have been training our students in First Aid for the last three years.

Year 11 have been looking at risk taking and staying safe at parties, they have looked at case studies from the news to ensure their own safety in situations where there might be alcohol and drugs present.

Year 10 Spanish Trip

Very early on the morning of Saturday 9 March (2:00 am!), 28 students and 3 members of staff boarded a



bus heading to Stansted Airport and then on to Castellón de la Plana in Spain for a varied five-day experience. Later on that same Saturday, whilst Nottingham was scourged by hail and snow, we enjoyed a beautiful 22 degrees and games on the beach.

We spent two days in our partner school where students made Spanish friends and had a taste of local life. We learnt a local street sport, ate tapas, visited some local caves and Peñiscola Castle, walked a coastal path and of course spoke lots of Spanish. The last day was spent in Valencia just before the famous Fallas festival started - we were lucky enough to see some of the models being constructed.

All our year 10 students were a credit both to themselves and the school. We hope they all enjoyed the change of environment and new challenges and have returned enthused to learn more Spanish.

UKMT (United Kingdom Maths Trust) Success



A team of four Nottingham Free School students, Dilan Duffus, Viktor Harrison, Yousaf Mughal, Jaydon Rakkar, travelled to Ashfield School to compete in the Regional Final of the UKMT Maths Challenge. Their aim was to build on last year's success when the team came 10th out of 28 schools.

The competition is demanding and our opponents included both Nottingham High Schools and the West Bridgford schools, all of whom usually make up the top few places.

The competition entails four rounds; a group round, were all members of the team work together to solve problems, two further rounds where the teams are split into pairs and have to pass answers

between them, and a final round which is a relay race.

After the first round we were delighted to find ourselves in the top five schools, so the pressure was on for the next couple of rounds to try and stay with the leaders. The top five places were again announced after round three and again we were amongst the top names. There was real excitement amongst the team as we knew that beating last year's placing was a real possibility. BUT it was going to be close - there was only two points between the top three teams!

Coming into the last round – the relay round – we knew that if we were going to stand a chance we had to do one thing (apart from be brilliant at maths!) – RUN!!! The boys did amazingly as they combined their PE skills with their maths brains and raced around the room collecting and answering **all** the questions in the relay. This event is not designed to be finished so the fact that they managed it is incredible.

A tense wait ensued for the final results, when it was announced that all their hard work had paid off and they had <u>won</u> the regional final!! The next stage is in London on Monday 17 June when the boys will compete against the top 88 teams from all over the country. Please wish them luck!
